Aso Kuju National Park is situated almost in the middle of mainland Kyusyu. It is characterized by Aso's caldera, one of the largest ones in the world (its circumference is about 100km). It also has the geographical features of volcanic mountains ranging in the northeastern part, a volcanic landform composed of Mt.Yufudake and Mt.Tsurumidake, and vast grasslands stretching at the foot of the mountains.

The Kuju Range has Mt.Nakadake, which is the highest mountain on mainland Kyusyu, and eight other peaks over 1,700 m. These mountains are colored with Kyusyu azaleas in early summer and with red leaves in autumn. Also, two marshes registered

The Kuju Range is a national park. It is prohibited to pick plants, catch animals or hurt them. Once the nature is destroyed, we can never bring them back as it is.



3 Go Bathroom Before Climbing

The bathrooms in the mountain cannot clear filthy water so efficiently. Human waste directly affects nature. Try not to go to the bathroom in the mountain. Please relieve yourself before departure.



®Take your trash back home

There is no trash can in the mountain. Who will pick the trash you throw away? Please leave mountains with your trash and take them back home.



No Pets!

Bringing your pet with you in the mountain may cause the mutual infection with wildlife. Also your pet may bother the other climbers who do not



Handle with care of the fire

The forest fire is often brought about by a climber's casual carelessness, such as throwing a cigarette away or pulling a cooking stove down. Please be careful when handling the fire.



5) Stocks and Rubber Caps!

You must attach rubber caps with your stocks. Without them, the sharp tips of the stocks will poke plants and hurt them. Please make sure if your stocks have caps before leaving



No auto-camp in the parking
