What is "Tadewara Marsh"?

The Tadewara Marsh is situated on the northwest side of the Kuju mountain range. In order to maintain the vegetation, and to prevent the forest from spreading, the local community conducts a controlled burning in the meadow every spring. This marsh was designated as wetland of international importance under the Ramsar Convention in 2005.
